Network Report

This year we're combining our Chairperson and Network Coordinator Reports to highlight the main activities of the Upper Murray Regional Neighbourhood House Network during 2022.

Whilst COVID may not have been quite as prevalent in the community as the previous two years, the impacts were still very evident as we started 2022.

With over two years of providing much needed support and assistance for people in their communities, including constant change, high emotions, grief and uncertainty, most managers and committees were feeling depleted before the year even began! It's an absolute credit to everyone involved in the neighbourhood houses in our Network (and the sector as a whole) that we rose to the challenge, continuing to work closely with our communities to innovate, create and connect.

The Upper Murray Regional Neighbourhood House Network (UMRNHN) played an important part in this by providing local and accessible supports and services for our sixteen members, as well as identifying strategic opportunities to build the capacity of our members and have a significant impact on the communities in which our members work. The sector is so fortunate to have this level of support funded by DFFH and available to neighbourhood houses at a local level, with staff and a governing body who understand the area and the rural and regional issues and opportunities we all face.

For the Network to operate effectively, we have a Committee of Governance (COG), with representation from our member neighbourhood houses. The COG sets the strategic direction of the Network, from advice provided by members and staff. The Network COG employs a Network Coordinator, Trish Curtis, whose role it is to provide operational and strategic support for members. We also employ two workers, Tanya Grant and Sophie Rhys, who do fantastic work on specific projects.

The following describes some of the highlights of 2022, against the three strategic priorities from the UMRNHN Strategic Plan 2022-2024.

Building Capacity

We think about the UMRNHN as a *network of members* who know, work with and support each other, as well as an incorporated association with staff who provide operational, strategic and governance support.

We saw the continued strengthening of relationships between managers through regular online gatherings and the end of year overnight forum, and also between the chairs and other committee members through the 6-weekly chair forums, run in partnership with Goulburn North East Association of Community Centres (GNEACC). People in our neighbourhood houses now have greater capacity to seek advice and support from each other, with less reliance on the Network Coordinator position. This is a great example of community development in action!

Having said that, the governance and operational support provided by the Network Coordinator throughout 2022 has been invaluable for many of our members as they've worked their way through some very difficult situations. This has included strategic and risk planning, governance advice and support for committees and boards, governance training and manager recruitment.

One of the key ways that we build the capacity of our Network members is through Network-wide projects. We have delivered several now, including two that were finalised in 2022. One of the success factors with these projects has been the engagement of expert consultants who have worked with participating neighbourhood houses to help build their skills and knowledge in the project area.

The most impactful so far has been the *Enabling Communities: from the heart of the community* bushfire recovery project. *Enabling Communities* built the capacity of the six participating neighbourhood houses and Network staff to work in emergency response and recovery through their work with consultant Anne Leadbeater, as well as working closely with each other.

The successful delivery of this project (and some additional lobbying) led to a further \$200,000 from the Department of Health to fund our social prescribing project, *Connecting Community in Upper Hume Pilot (CCUHP)*. Based on the Living Our Best Life model developed by the CHAOS Neighbourhood House Network in Eastern Metropolitan Region, this project started late in 2022 with four neighbourhood houses participating by the end of the year. We believe this project will also have ongoing impact across our Network.

Raising the Profile

The *Enabling Communities* project has also had significant flow on impacts as neighbourhood houses are becoming better recognised for their work in emergency preparation, response and recovery, and resilience more generally. Through the work of this project, the Network is represented on several important region-wide groups and committees, including:

- Ovens Murray Mental Health, Alcohol & Drug Alliance (OMMHADA)
- Towong and Alpine Shires People & Wellbeing Recovery Working Groups
- VCOSS Disaster Recovery Outcomes Framework Working Group
- Hume Region Recovery Committee (ERV)
- Hume Region Social Recovery Committee (DFFH)

We partnered with Paul Ryan and the Upper Hume Primary Care Partnership to run three Resilience Forums in Chiltern, Wodonga and Corryong. This was an opportunity for our Network to be closely associated with resilience work, and for us to emphasise the important role that neighbourhood houses have as valuable community assets and potential ‘resilience hubs’.

The development of the Network Photo Library, coordinated by Tanya Grant, took place in 2022, with almost all members participating. Paul Smith from Supergoat Media took a wonderful array of photos at the participating neighbourhood houses, ranging from gardens and buildings to the most wonderful group shots. These photos are available through an online platform and are a wonderful, high quality resource for any of our Network members.

The “Connect with Community Referral Guide” developed as part of the *Behind the Scenes* gambling harm reduction project was printed and distributed to a wide range of regional stakeholders in 2022. This guide has been a great way to demonstrate the diversity and breadth of offerings through our Network members.

Having an Impact

The Network-wide projects, including our new contract with Social Enterprise Victoria, led by Sophie Rhys, to coordinate the development of the Hume Social Enterprise Network, have been significantly impactful for our members, and the Network itself. We have also supported projects being delivered by members, including the Pangerang Mobile Hub and the Myrtleford Neighbourhood Centre FRRR community activation project. The Network exists to empower, support and enable our members to be outstanding and impactful community development leaders in their communities, so it’s critical that we continue to look for meaningful ways to do this.

The snapshot provided in this report will give you an idea of the work achieved by the Network in 2022. It’s been another big year, and I want to acknowledge and thank my fellow Committee members for their commitment to the ongoing success of the Network.

Thanks also to the hard work of our wonderful staff – Trish, Tanya and Sophie - and what they continue to achieve on our behalf.

AGM Treasurers Report – 2023

I wish to present the Upper Murray Regional Neighbourhood House Collective Incorporated AGM Treasurer's report for 2022 financial period.


The 2022 reviewed financial statement has been finalised, with a recorded loss of \$(10,894).

We had a planned deficit of \$(20,000) (this was reduced by half), drawing down on retained earnings to undertake a network wide photo project. This project has been very successful, as have all the activities undertaken by the network throughout the year. The Initiatives Fund as listed in the Income Statement P&L expended \$54,000 to participating Neighbourhood Houses within our network, supporting the Bushfire Recovery Projects and Social Prescribing Projects.

We are in a very secure financial position, with current retained earnings being \$38,091.

Trish has continued to attract significant funding and activities throughout the network, finalising the Bushfire Grant and Responsible Gambling projects in 2022, commencing the Social Prescribing project at the end of 2022 and continuing work with SENVIC into 2023.

Trish should be commended for her ability to attract funding into the network, benefiting all the Houses within our Network, and broaden her scope of impact within the Upper Murray community. Well done for another successful year Trish.





Notes to the Financial Statements

Upper Murray Regional Neighbourhood House Collective Inc. For the year ended 31 December 2022

1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act of Victoria. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation resulting from past events, for which it is probable that there will be an outflow of economic benefits and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured using the best estimate available of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established. Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

These financial statements are unaudited.

These notes should be read in conjunction with the attached financial statements.



If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the assets and liabilities statement are shown inclusive of GST.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.


